Tales From the Gym (Part 2)

"A Quiet Mind: Buddhist Ways to Calm the Noise in Your Head"

We are heading in the one of my favorite times of the year, the Holiday Season. The focus at this time of year is appreciation, gratitude, and reflection on the year that will soon come to an end. What does it mean to have these feelings and why do we feel a certain way?

The Oxford Dictionary offers us two ways of defining "reflect". The first is to "embody something in an appropriate way" and the other is "to think deeply or carefully about." How do you embody appreciation and gratitude? It is something that we should carefully think about.

In growing up, I was taught to hold the door open for people as I am entering or exiting someplace, especially if someone's hands are full. Sometimes there is an ensuing battle of "go ahead!" "No, you go ahead!" until someone relents and proceeds through the door.

Once I was at the gym and I held the door open for a lady and was rather startled at the reception. "Why are you holding the door open for me? I look handicap? I am more than capable of opening the door!" Somehow our society has formed us into living a life of suspicion, ulterior motives, and this feeling of treating people rather inferior.

The first of the Four Noble Truths tells us that in life there is suffering. What makes this remarkable is, this kind of suffering is self-inflicted and can be prevented. As Rev. Matsumoto says, we have to face up to these emotions and search for the cause. This facing up to is two-fold in that it's not only in the unappreciative person, but for myself also. Where is this anger coming from and how do I respond to it? If I were to lash out to this person, I would lower myself to her level and be just as ungrateful. It's better to just detach from the situation and grow from it.

As we start this great time of year, we should celebrate the Holiday Season, not as a religious thing, but as a human thing and see how we can instill that "Holiday Spirit" in our everyday life, and not just at this time of year.

One of the ideals in Buddhism is that life is impermanent. I like to think of it as life is in constant flux, we don't have to be or do everything in life, just do you. This Holiday Season is a great time to discover who YOU are and find YOUR place in this world, as we reflect on the end of the year.

Am I the person holding the door open for someone, or am I the angry person who is looking down on the person opening the door for me? Am I holding the door open wanting to be acknowledged for my good deed or am I the one holding the door out of respect for a fellow sentient being? Am I living life in fear and paranoia or is fear and paranoia living in me?

BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORT

An extraordinary gift from Rev. and Mrs. Kie

Rev. Soshin and Mrs. Akiko Kie were selfless Nembutsu followers, who spent their entire lives spreading the dharma to many in Hawaii, Japan, and Okinawa. Rev. and Mrs. Kie wisely invested in commercial property in Kalihi, which provided them with income during their lifetime and which they generously bequeathed, upon their passing, jointly to Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, Pacific Buddhist Academy, and Moiliili Hongwanji Mission. The sale of that property closed in September, and 30% of the \$3 million cash sale was provided to MHM.

One of the provisos of the sale is that income from the gift be used for a music program at Moiliili Hongwanji. Mrs. Kie was particularly fond of music and played the organ at the temples they served. The Kie sisters—Lily Masuda, Emma Kie, and Ayumi Weissbuch—have been asked to co-chair a committee to determine what kind of music or arts program will be suitable to fulfill the wishes of the family. Others will be invited to join the committee, and volunteers are welcome.

We are truly grateful to Rev. and Mrs. Kie and the entire Kie family for this special gift and the opportunity to allow music and art to flourish at Moiliili Hongwanji and bring new life to the temple and our sangha!

East-West Center seeking Host Families

Dr. Jerald Satoru Takesono is a retired dentist and a longtime member of Hawaii Betsuin. His father, Rev. Seikaku Takesono, was a Honpa Hongwanji minister. Dr. Takesono wrote the following open letter to invite Hongwanji members to become host families to East-West Center students. Dr. Takesono and his wife, Betsy, have participated in the East-West Center Ohana Host Family Program for 40 years.

Dear Hongwanji members:

The Friends of the East-West Center (EWC) sponsors a program called the Ohana Host Family Program, which matches students from other parts of the world with host families who provide EWC students with a family away from home while they are at the University of Hawaii. The students are all graduate students and very often return home to become leaders in their home countries.

Host families need not provide housing (all students are housed in dormitories on campus) but are asked to give these students coming from all over the world a sense of the Aloha spirit and to expose them to American and Hawaiian culture, especially at holidays like Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day. There are no financial obligations.

Many EWC students from Asia are Buddhist and curious about our unique form of Buddhism, a blend of Japanese, American, and Hawaiian culture and traditions. Over the years, we have hosted two Buddhist students from Thailand, one Hindu student from Malaysia, and a Maori student who had a great interest in the similarities of the cultures of Hawaii and New Zealand. To this day, we continue to maintain contact with all of them. Our two daughters greatly benefited from the exposure to different cultures.

The Ohana Host Family Program seeks more host families, who can offer EWC students a positive, personal experience of Hawaii. Are you willing to share some of your time and hospitality? In exchange, you'll learn about a different culture, become friends with students from other countries, and support these students as they journey through graduate studies at the University of Hawaii.

Renovating News

In October the Renovation Committee met with representatives of the Design Assist company, Ralph S. Inouye (RSI), to review the cost estimates given by subcontractors. The initial total cost estimate was just under \$2.1 million. Priorities and alternative options were discussed so a revised cost estimate is awaited.

- 1. New fencing with opaque screen wall along perimeter of the Makai Parking Lot, plus rolling gate. New lighting was held for possible future installation.
- 2. Social Hall flooring will be Luxury Vinyl Plank. Acoustic ceiling tiles will be installed in alternate bays having no light fixtures. Partitions will be upgraded. Manual roller shades will be added to all windows. Ten additional electric outlets will be added, plus 5 fire alarm devices and relocation of light switches. All the doors will be replaced. A new entry way and door will be added to connect the Elevator foyer with the Social Hall.
- 3. Restrooms will be completed renovated, with toilet stalls and sinks reconfigured to allow for one large stall in each restroom. This deletes plans for a separate Family Restroom.
- 4. Kitchen will have some HVAC work (ducts, fans, etc.) and additional electric outlets to allow for future installation of window AC units.
- 5. Courtyard will have permeable pavers but a canopy covering was deleted. The Annex sidewalk along the back (Diamond Head side) will be extended to the vegetation line 1-½' from the border fence wall. The CMU wall will be taken down to just above ground level, capped with concrete and a vinyl fence installed.
- 6. The Annex flooring will be Luxury Vinyl Plank same as the Social Hall. Partition will be replaced as well as all exterior doors. Four (4) additional electric outlets will be added.
- 7. Office Window Leak will be repaired by re-caulking the suspect areas around the window.

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
